Dayton! May 20-22, 2011

It's almost here! In just a little over a week, thousands will converge on Dayton Ohio for the 60th year of the annual Dayton Hamvention. Started in 1952, the event attracted 600. The first prize was a Collins 75A2. It has grown and shrunk over the years, topping 33,000 at one point, with an average of 17,000 to 18,000 attending now. It is the World's largest Amateur Radio event and continues to excite the whole Amateur Radio community.

If you plan to go, here are some tips and helps for your trip.

Hotels - there are many rooms still available at the writing of this newsletter. The number is limited, and many locations are full, but space is available in and around Dayton. Don't wait to book - most have free cancellation if needed.

Flea Market spaces are still available and will continue to be during the Hamvention weekend. Walk-in registrations are accepted, but it is best to go online and book your space ahead so you can pick from the remaining spaces. This is much different from a few years ago when spaces were allocated on a lottery basis and not all applicants got a space!

Our new trailer will be in the Flea Market for rest and relaxation of all TCARC members. It has a couple of bunks, comfortable seats, tables, and radios. We will have food and cold drinks available in the trailer. Stop by the K9QZI usual spaces and take advantage of the trailer. Spaces are 1513-1516 on the West side of the arena, just beyond the West food tent. Items you purchase may be left in the trailer while you shop for more. You are most welcome to just stop by and say hi, or relax outside the trailer as well. Cooking and toilet facilities will not be available in the trailer as they are prohibited by local ordinance.

D-Star REF038C will be linked to Dayton, so we will try to have our W9YR connected to 38C during Hamvention.

Repeater Update The K9CU Repeater

Over this past weekend, many changes took place in our 146.76 repeater. The callsign is now K9CU, reflecting the Champaign-Urbana location. A new controller is in place, providing more control and several new options. The original receiver was repaired and reinstalled. A temporary receiver has been in place for a few months. The Echolink node is now K9CU, keeping the node number of 8231. To connect to it, look up K9CU in the program on your computer, or touch tone in 8231 on your radio if you are at another repeater location.

As the installation was just made, many adjustments are needed as we use the system. Please be patient as we check for problems and for ways to improve the operation, and be tolerant of some of the strange voices that identify the system. Ben, K9BF, set up the controller, while Mark, KC9DUU, worked on the Echolink node. As you probably know, the Echolink node is at the repeater site, sharing the Internet connection with our W8YR D-Star repeater. Please let Ben or Mark know of any irregularities in the repeater operation. Watch for new features with the identifier, announcements, and automatic functions. Thanks to Ben and Mark for their efforts!

Hamfests

May 1 found many TCARC members in Arthur, Illinois, attending the MARK Hamfest 50th anniversary. As always, it was a very nice hamfest, located in and around the Arthur Fire Station. The weather cooperated well and the crowd was good. Everyone enjoyed the event.

Coming up, June 5 is the Starved Rock Radio Club Hamfest in Princeton, Illinois. This is now a one-day hamfest, Sunday only. It is at the fairgrounds on the West side of Princeton. Mostly outside, it is always an enjoyable hamfest.

Springfield D-Star

Icom has an offer out to provide D-Star repeaters to clubs not having a D-Star system nearby. The Sangamon Valley Radio Club in Springfield, Illinois decided to investigate the offer. An application to Icom is the first step. Icom will pick 70 clubs nationwide and will reimburse the purchase price of a controller and one RF module, provided certain conditions are met. The system must be on the air, have at least 10 registered to use it, and remain operational for at least one year. N9UWI, Oliver, a SVRC club member who grew up in Champaign, picked up on the offer and presented it to the club. He requested K9QZI to make a presentation on D-Star to the club members last week. Overall, they were most interested and wish to pursue the grant. They have a location at the top of St John's Hospital, complete with Internet access. Feedline will be very short. Hopefully, Icom will select the SVRC as a recipient and we will see another D-Star system in the area. We wish them the best!

Trailer

Several members purchased the trailer to be used for some of our activities. Jim, N9AJV, is heading up the trailer functions. Thanks to Jim and Al, K9SI, along with several others, the trailer is now usable for activities. The bed was removed and replaced with an operating table. Wiring is in for AC power as well as hefty 12 volt power. A feed through box is installed in the front of the trailer, providing access to the outside for cables, power, rotors, or whatever else needed. We have some equipment, but we would like to have much more in the way of radios and antennas. Donations are most welcome. Also, we probably will pass the hat for more \$\$ contributions from anyone wishing to help. If you have not participated, now is your opportunity. Please contact Jim for details and to contribute. The trailer is not an official item of the club, but several members purchased it for the use of the club. We can use any assistance you can give.

ARRL Insurance

Effective May 1st, the ARRL has changed program administrators and insurance companies for its ARRL-sponsored Equipment Insurance and Club Liability insurance plans. The League has signed an agreement with Hays Affinity Group to serve as the program administrator to provide equipment insurance to its members who choose to elect coverage. Hays will be replacing Marsh Affinity Group Services as the program's administrator and will be introducing new policies, underwritten by the Hanover Insurance Company.

Members who are currently insured under the old plans are likely to receive a notice from Marsh, announcing the change. Be assured, if you currently have equipment or club liability insurance provided through Marsh Affinity Group, your coverage will continue through the end of the current policy term. But keep in mind that when your policy expires, your coverage will not automatically be switched over to Hays. In addition, beginning May 1, the ARRL will no longer be able to help you resolve any issues you may have with Marsh, the insurance company or their claims paying agent. Our contractual agreement with them has been terminated. Details at ARRL
